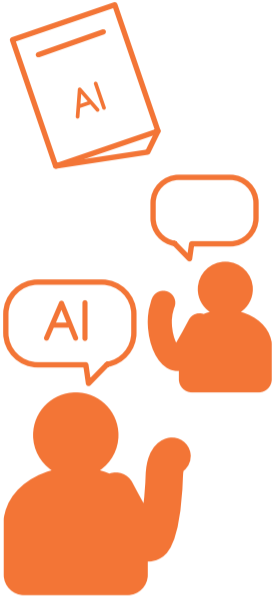




Welcome to the third newsletter of the ArIN project!

What have we done so far?



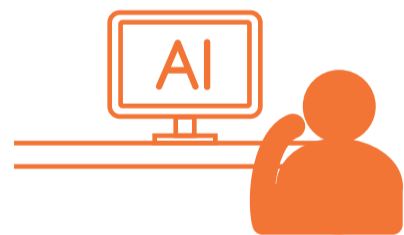
The past few months have been of intensive and very fruitful work. After delineating the methodology they were going to follow, partners started working on Activity 2 of the Project Result 1 of the project (Educational Programme in AI Literacy), which consisted of the development of learning modules for three levels of difficulty, which will be later gathered into a comprehensive and innovative learning course.

Each level of difficulty – Basic, Intermediate, Advanced – comprises 4 modules (Key Concepts, AI-Human Interaction, Advantages/scenarios/applications and Risk & Threats), except for the first level, which also includes an introductory module, crucial for people who want to start learning about AI. The training path will also include glossaries with the most relevant terms and concepts used, as well as a comprehensive and extensive list of references and additional resources, which can be consulted by learners so they can deepen their knowledge.

What will the training programme consist of?

As mentioned before, the Training Programme will be structured into three levels, allowing for progression and also for the acquisition of different competencies, depending on the depth of the knowledge learners want to have. The modules (13 in total) will be transformed into attractive and user-friendly digital training, made available to all through an online platform, and will be complemented by digital resources and tools which will contribute to expanding and consolidating the competencies learned.

The target groups of the training programme are, primarily, adults, but also adult trainers and training organisations; however, anyone interested in learning more about AI can enrol in the training, as it provides resources very adequate to all levels of expertise.



What are the next steps?

Very soon, all modules created will be available in English and in all partners' languages – Italian, Lithuanian, Spanish, Portuguese, and Swedish – and publically accessible through the platform. In June, partners will also gather for their Transnational Meeting in Perugia, Italy, where they will define the details of the pilot testing process and the next steps of the ArIN project.
